### Do you have reference/research facilities?

The Museum has a collection of books relating to the woollen industry. It is our intention that these will be available to the public for research, but this is not yet possible. We hope to have a list of our books online in the near future.

An excellent source of information about the town's heritage is: **An Historical and Archaeological Study of the Industrial Heritage of Newtown, Powys, Mid-Wales**, Mark Walters CPAT, 2003 which is available online.

The Newtonian, published by the Newtown Local History Group, has numerous articles relating to the Textile Museum, the woollen industry and the town in general. Ask us for details. A complete set of these publications is available at the Newtown Library.

### Where can you search for family history?

The Montgomeryshire Genealogical Society [www.montgomeryshiregs.org.uk](http://www.montgomeryshiregs.org.uk) has a wide range of documents and material available. See their website for information on how to contact them.

Most residents of Penygloddfa were buried in Llanllwchaiarn parish churchyard, or the old churchyard next to the river - St Marys, or after 1847 in St Davids churchyard in the town.

The Museum is working to determine the residents of the houses that form our building, and the area generally. This information will be available for visitors. A list of names, by surname, taken from the 1841 and 1851 census will be available for visitors to look at.

The Newtown Library has an excellent local history research room, and the Powys County Archives at Llandrindod Wells also hold extensive records. Bookings are essential for the Archives.

### What else is in the town relating to its history?

There are two other small museums in the town and also the **Oriel Davies Art Gallery**.

**Robert Owen Museum**, The Cross, Broad Street houses a collection of objects, pictures and written material relating to the life of the social reformer, Robert Owen, who was born, and died, in the town. There is a statue of him near the Post Office and his grave is at St Marys Church.

**W.H. Smiths** have a small interesting museum on the first floor of their shop in High Street. The contents relate primarily to the growth of the company.
